







Papers reviewed per year


4. On average, how many papers do you review per year?

5. On average, how long does it take to review a paper?





7. What are the most common reasons why you decline an invitation to review a paper? Please rank the reasons provided (1 = most common reason; 4 = least common reason)




Comments (question 7)

- I sometimes refuse to review a paper because if feel it is ideologically on conflict with my principles. I make this clear to the editors because I want to make a political statement, or to say that it would be unfair because I would begin with an unfair negative perspective.
- I have started to turn down reviews in journals that are not open access, because I resent having to work for free for a publisher that then makes money selling access to its journal, so I have decided to cut down on reviews (as review as many papers as I intend to publish in a single year).




Comments (question 8)

9. How many papers have you rejected in the last year?




Comments (question 9)
